Due to not be able to continue with FACS in our district and evaluating the success and popularity of Mrs. Hinrichsen's Ag program, we have added an additional Ag pathway. This led to hiring an additional teacher and FFA sponsor. It would have been easy for someone who has successfully built a strong program from the start to be hesitant to add an additional Ag pathway, should it take away from her program. On the contrary, Nicole saw the value of Ag in our district and the consistent growth of the FFA chapter and was excited to support the opportunities it could provide to our students." Mrs. Marie Umphenour student taught at McLouth in the spring of 2021 and was hired as the second instructor for 2021-2022.
